Project Overview

Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

Access of dental care for school children is a key factor influencing oral health outcomes. A good oral health promotes life-long health, learning, job success, and relationships with others. Dental caries in school children is a major public health concern in Taiwan which is mostly concentrated in remote areas. Children with dental caries may cause pain and suffering, influence growth, development, and cognitive function, and lead to oral health problems in later life.

School-based dental service is an ideal setting for improving oral hygiene and positive oral health behaviors among school children. It can increase access to preventive services such as oral health education, screening, fluoride varnish, dental diagnosis, referral and treatment at minimum cost, especially for those who come from vulnerable families. There are many elementary schools in Tainan rural area and insufficient dental health workforce. The setting up of a dental clinic within school health center can increase the access of dental service for school children. Tainan Municipal Jiangjyun District Kunshen Elementary School, Danei District Ersi Elementary School, Cigu District Cigu Elementary School, Cigu District Longshan Elementary School, Sigang District Songlin Elementary School, Dongshan District Shengsian Elementary School and Guanmiao District Guanmiao Elementary School are all located in the region lacked adequate dental service.

There is only 0.87 dentist per 10,000 population. Most of the school children are single-parent and vulnerable people with low-income families. The low-income families are twice as likely to have cavities, compared with children from higher-income households. They face barriers to access dental service due to the geographic location and their caregiver with poor oral health literacy. Some parents just don't know when to start dental check-up and are not motivated to seek dental service for children. To bridge the gap between dental service facilities provision and utilization, we require practical and flexible approaches to distribute the dentists which include dentistry for providing dental services at school-based dental clinics.

We plan to purchase dental care equipment in school health centers of these seven elementary schools. The budget for this program is about 98,000 USD. The aim of this program is to reduce the prevalence of dental caries among rural school children by increasing the access to dental service, such as oral health education, screening, fluoride varnish, dental diagnosis, referral, case management and treatment of 799 school children and staff periodically to ensure the timely oral care for them. Caring for our school children to smile at a time, the "Growing up with smiles" program for the rural school children provides regular dental check-up to help them get their best start in life.

Why did you choose to partner with this organization and what will its role be?

There are three main reasons as follows:

- 1.The seven Elementary Schools are all located in remote districts of Tainan. The remote districts lack dental clinics and dentists. The population of the six remote districts is 127,041, but there are only 11 dentists providing.
- 2.The prevalence of caries in school children is higher than 53.02 percent. Therefore, we cooperate with the National Health Insurance Administration, to coordinate appropriate medical service institutions with national insurance to participate and support the project to improve the overall dental service. Then, we help to purchase dental equipment for providing timely dental treatment and oral health education.
- 3.We also cooperate with Tainan Dental Association, which helps to send professional dentists in rotation to go to these schools to provide school children with good dental diagnosis and oral health care. Moreover, this dental service will expand to the disadvantaged residents in the nearby neighborhood to meet the need of the districts. That is, one dentist serves 11,549 people compared with the other districts of Tainan, where one dentist serves 1,589 people. The people served by every dentist in the remote districts are seven times more than those in the other districts.

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

- 1.1,000 students and staff can receive a comprehensive or periodic oral evaluation and treatment by offering convenient in-school dental care.
- 2.Provide school children with timely dental care and oral hygiene education in schools to reduce the rate of dental caries.
3. 127 thousand community vulnerable residents can receive a comprehensive or periodic oral evaluation and treatment.

How did your project team identify these needs?

The staff of the Southern Division of National Health Insurance Administration visited the principals of Cigu, Longshan, Songlin, Kunshen, Ersi, Shengsian, Guanmiao the seven Elementary Schools, to do field survey.

The investigation report is as follows:

- 1.According to the research, child outpatient rate of Tainan is 55% lower than that of the nation (57%). The main reason is school children in remote areas can't receive proper dental service because of the urban-rural gap. Even though the dentists are willing to go to school, limited by the insufficient equipment, they only make use of conference tables or desk chairs instead of dental chairs.
2. Cigu,Longshan, Songlin, Kunshen, Ersi, Shengsian, Guanmiao Elementary Schools are located in remote towns, with inconvenient transportation and surrounded by fields. There are few medical clinics and dental clinics nearby. Most of the school children are disadvantaged people from low-income family. Parents are often busy with work and have no time to take care of them. Therefore, the prevalence of caries in school children is higher than 53.02%.
- 3.The proportion of the elderly population in the local community is quite high. When these vulnerable children and elderly residents have dental problems , they must go to distant towns or the city, so they usually delay or neglect the dental service due to various inconvenience such as transportation issues. The dental service of these vulnerable people is ignored for a long term and it is very important to have dental treatment resources to take care of their oral health.

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

The remote area school children and community residents can be directly taken care by in-school based dental care. School-based dental centers provide access and treatment modalities to enable dentists to provide a range of dental care. It makes it easier for school children to receive care because they don't have to travel to an appointment. Parents do not have to take time off to bring their children to the health care providers, and school children do not miss hours of school time sitting in a provider's office.

How were community members involved in planning the project?

School principals assist in propagating the dental treatment resources and ask for the village chief, local powerful people and relevant government departments to assist in propagating and letting more vulnerable residents know the in-school based dental center which will benefit more community residents in need.

The seven elementary school children have regular dental checkups to guide children and vulnerable people on how to brush their teeth properly, apply fluoride, do checkup and treatment, and cooperate with other groups including the government, non-profit organizations and private companies to increase efficiency.

- 1.Regular dental service: Regular providing services include apply fluoride, strengthen the oral health education and practical operations of patients and caregivers.
- 2.Regular prevention: Propagate oral hygiene skills while having treatment and arrange time to check and clean teeth.

Students in the seven elementary schools face barriers to access dental service due to the geographic location and their caregiver with poor oral health literacy. We require practical and flexible approaches to distribute the dentists who are all experienced professionals in this field and include dentistry for providing dental services at school-based dental clinics.
